4. Articles

"Cry Havoc and Let loose the Dogs of War." or A Master Class in Fletching By lord Jean Amy, fletcher extraordinaire

First off so this does not continue to annoy me, I was not impressed with those who said they were coming along and did not turn up.

A few months ago Chel asked me if I would run a class at the Bacchus Wood Collegia and in a moment of weakness I agreed. So over the next few months we agreed it would be a double session and it would be Master Class in Fletching, not aimed at beginners but rather at people who can make arrows and now want something a bit better and different. So finally the other week we got it sorted and timetabled for Sunday Morning.

Sunday duly arrived and I was there with a car full of fletching paraphernalia. (I got the impression that some people were a tad surprised that so much stuff could just be for sticking a few feathers on a stick – were they in for a surprise or were they in for a surprise.) Anyhow, the hour of 1000 hours arrived and away we went – no waiting for stragglers at Grahame's Class.

A quick introduction was run through with what can be done with arrows. I had brought along about 2 dozen arrows of mine own and they were all different, crowned shafts, self nock and plastic nocks, stained shafts and shafts with each end stained a different colour, shafts with tiny flight fletches and Flu-flu's wearing half a Turkey plus cresting and some very fancy ones featuring images of archers and crests. Hmm... bit of a range there.

Time to give everyone their shafts, I had cut self-nocks in them, and tell them of their projects for the day. Number One was a fully bound Medieval arrow Circa 1100-1500 and no using a fletching jigs to make it – Yep, time to learn how to







fletch without a jig. Number Two was going to be a bit easier and it was just a garden-variety target arrow but with hand chopped spliced fletches and cresting.



First task, learn how to finish off the self-nocks. Plaintive cry from one member, "I don't use power tools", I hear as they seen a rather hefty linisher on the bench. In my everhelpful manner I gave them the good news. "You do now". Must have been a bit of a success as much later in the day as I was packing up said person was beavering away at the linisher finishing the self-nocks on a number of leftover shafts to take home and practice.

So a quick demonstration and away went the merry crew finishing off the self nocks and cross drilling them so they would act a bit like a plastic clip-on. I though I heard a but of scuffling accompanied by some words about a error with the linisher and getting a replacement shaft but I could have been mistaken. Next task, cutting fletches with a pair of scissors – just like they did so many years ago. It was an interesting experience, even more so when everyone managed to get it done – although some were lagging behind. *(Note to self: "Bring whip to the next class".)*

I don't think anyone really believed me when I said they were going to fletch the arrows without a jig but it did happen. Yep, they all managed to fletch their arrows without a jig and, all the fletches were fully bound. Somewhere in the middle of this a couple of stragglers wandered in and went into 'work fast' mode to catch up.



Not to worry. As time whistled past, people sealed the bindings on their shafts and moved onto project two. A quick demo on how feather choppers work was accompanied by a bit of chat on the theory of feather splicing. And while they were starring starry-eyed I spliced and chopped a fletch, Impressive. So once again everyone was away but things were now getting a bit complex. Everyone learnt which side the tape goes on when you are temporarily holding all the pieces together. This was accomplished by seeing what happens when put it on the wrong side and then chop. What followed was a lot of tape-tearing and gluing down as some people decided that they also had the tape on the wrong side. Some member also discovered that fletches go in a certain way in the jig while others learnt why you peel the tape off in one direction – not the other. And whilst all this was happening they got another dose of information and a demo' on how to crest an arrow. Feathers were being chopped, fletches were being glued and shafts were being crested – all at the same time. Talk about a hive of activity.

Finally it all came to an end, everyone had achieved their goal and perfectly timed I can say – we only ran one and half hours over time. But, everyone learnt a lot and the "Bacchus Wood Arrow Making Bar" has been ratcheted up another few notches. Over a wonderful lunch, and a big thanks to those who prepared it, we had a bit of a chat about next years. The general consensus seems to be that for next years Collegia it will be a Master Class in Arrow Shaft making.

Yep, I can see that is going to be fun. A board, a saw, a plane and some time later not only an arrow shaft but a barrelled shaft as well and then there is the joy of footing arrows and timber or horn reinforced nocks – hmm... might be a long day again..

To finish off to those who came along – it was great to see you and I hoped you learnt a bit.

Unfortunately it was a Spanish treasure galleon & had no colours left to show. This resulted in the withdrawal of his letter of marque. Que sera sera!
- 1589-October:
 Pronounced a pirate by the Governor of Havana, Cuba & so the story begins
